

Create exciting quilts using 2½" fabric strips and various rulers.

Quilts with other rulers



Table runner


Chain piece the strips together as per the quilt instructions. Use the **Strip Tube Ruler** to cut triangles. If the triangles are larger than the ruler extend the length with the **Miniline Plus ruler**.

Thousand Pyramids

Kerry found a **Tri-acu-Angle ruler** in her cupboard and wondered how she could use it with strips.

Sew two strips together with a ¼" seam top and bottom to make a tube.

Place pointed top of ruler on edge of fabric and line up horizontal lines of the ruler on the bottom edge.




Using rotary cutter, 'top and tail' cuts along full length. Open out each triangle to form a diamond. You will need to loosen stitches on the point. Place your finger between the layers and flick - the stitches will pop undone.



Press seams to one side and sew diamonds to each other to form a new strip.

Sew the strips together to form the quilt called a *Thousand Triangles*.



Log Cabin

Kerry used the Strip Tube ruler to help keep blocks square.

Rail Fence

8" block finished. Chain piece four strips together and crosscut at 8 ½".
