Upper Wedge

Lower Wedge

You'll need:

A Two Piece Ten Degree tool A Cut A Round tool (optional) (If you don't have the tool, a paper template is included.)

Option:

To use a one piece Ten Degree tool simply use the upper, then the lower portion. The 14" line is the dividing line.

Fabric Selection

If you choose a fabric that looks different if turned in the opposite direction, we call it a directional print. ...but...Directional fabric can be lots of fun! See the charts for help.


Batting	one 36" square	36"	1 yd
Backing	one 36" square	26"	1 yd
Binding	six 2 ½" on bias	18"	½ yd


A Wedges


- Cut a 14" square of Fabric A.
- Cut 11 ¼" wide strips from the remaining Fabric A.
- Cut 9 Fabric A wedges using the Lower Wedge.

B and C Wedges

- Cut 11 ¼" wide strips of Fabric B and C.
- Cut 18 Fabric B wedges using the Upper Wedge.
- Cut 9 Fabric C wedges using the **Upper Wedge**.








Assembly

• Sew the wedges together to make a ring. Sew in A, B, C, B order.

Circle Applique

- Stabilize the center of the circle using a large piece of freezer paper.
- Fold a second piece of freezer paper in half twice.
- Trace the quarter circle line found below onto a quarter portion of the paper.
- Cut the freezer paper circle.
- Iron the circle to the wrong side of the fabric square.
- Trim the fabric ¼" from the edge.
- Using a glue stick turn the edges over the edge of the freezer paper.
- Center and pin the applique onto the ring.
- Sew around the edge of the applique.
